## CASTING NOTES

- Determine your player count and then assign roles, from top to the bottom.
- For example, if you have 31 players, assign roles 01-31. There is a minimum player count of 25 to play the game.
- It is desirable to cast participants in roles they are comfortable with in order to give them the greatest opportunity for an engaging experience. Please note that different roles feature different styles of gameplay. Note the social, academic, and prestige rating of each role and assign participants based on your assessment of what style of gameplay they will enjoy.

<b>Social Rating</b>	This is an indication of the social demands on the role. Extroverted students will enjoy the demands of the higher rated roles.
<b>Academic Rating</b>	This is an indication of the academic demands on the role.
<b>Prestige Rating</b>	This is an indication of the prestige or perceived "importance" of a role.

<b>Members of "Washington's Cabinet"</b>	Blue-bordered roles are members of "Washington's Cabinet" and play most of the simulation advising the President and making decisions for the Executive Branch.

Red-shaded roles are considered the most challenging roles in the game.
Blue-shaded roles are "partisan leader" roles, good for students that want to roleplay and are comfortable with competition.
Orange shaded roles (in the Social Rating column) propose and draft a bill in Congress.

- The roles of Ambassador Genet, Brant, Big Warrior, Freneau, and Fenno require social, confident, self-starting participants. These roles are the more important roles to cast appropriately.
- The roles of President Washington and Ambassador Genet require speaking in front of the group and rewards players who take the initiative to speak publicly.
- The press roles in the simulation are highly political and partisan. Journalism students pursuing "objective" reporting of the facts might be frustrated to be put in such a role. (Exception: Webster is a non-partisan role)
